For Educators and School/District Leaders

1. Professional Development – Designed especially for history and civics teachers, workshops provide resources on teaching the role of the North in slavery, the legacy of slavery, and the importance of teaching in a sensitive way given how formative it is for black and white students, as well as other groups, when they learn about slavery. These workshops can be held at individual schools, at conferences, or for school districts as an in-service.

2. Unpacking Race & Privilege Dynamics – Help increase the sensitivity and competence of staff, teachers, and board members to address matters of race and privilege, using models that reduce defensiveness and lead to breakthroughs in dialogue and relationship building.
